WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

After a year of change for Nova, my second year as president of Nova's board of directors was one of progress.

Anne-Sophie Schlader has now been in the role as executive director for one year. In that time, she and her team successfully filled vacancies for all administrative and operational roles. That's been no easy task in what has become a very-challenging employment market.

Anne-Sophie and her new staff fundraiser also planted many funding-related seeds, some of which are already coming to fruition. One of the ways that Nova is working to ensure its long-term financial sustainability is by raising its profile. This includes efforts to build and nurture key stakeholder relationships and increase publicity, as contemplated in Nova's current five-year strategic plan. A wonderful example of recent incredible exposure for Nova specifically and at-home palliative care generally is a La Presse article and 98.5 FM radio interviews by prominent journalist Patrick Lagacé. In addition, Nova participated in a fundraising initiative of la Fondation Québécoise du cancer (la marche de Montréal).

The importance of Nova's indispensable work is reflected in some statistics. [For example, in the past year, Nova's home health aides increased the number of hours of respite under Nova's palliative care and home support programs by more than 12% compared to the previous year, to more than 12,950 hours.]

In addition to filling staff vacancies, Nova added a number of new board members. These talented and experienced people bring expertise in clinical services, communications, fundraising, human resources and social work. And these new directors nicely complement the returning board members and their areas of expertise, such as accounting, clinical services, finance and legal.

No president's report is complete without recognition of those who participate in and contribute to Nova's success. In addition to thanking Nova's administrative staff, nurses, home health aides, social worker and board members, I wish to acknowledge the many individuals and organizations that provide Nova's funding. The list includes [Grace Dart Foundation, Quebec Blue Cross®, I'Appui, the CIUSSS du Centre-Ouest-de-I'Île-de-Montréal, the CIUSSS du Centre-Sud-de-I'Île-de-Montréal and the CIUSSS de I'Ouest-de-I'Île-de-Montréal].

Later in 2023, we are planning to celebrate the recent achievement of a milestone: Nova's 125th anniversary. This celebration will be fuelled by optimism for Nova's bright future, and will be a great opportunity to highlight the outstanding work of the clinical team. Finally, I would like to recognize Nova's patients and their caregivers, who carry the cause of access to home care close to their hearts.

HOME PALLIATIVE CARE PROGRAM

The home palliative care program comprises active, holistic and comprehensive care that meets the various needs of patients—especially end-of-life patients—who have received a guarded prognosis as well as the needs of their loved ones.

Our nurses work closely with oncologists, palliative care physicians and other specialties, as well as nurse navigators in hospitals and CLSCs. Nova's nurses make home visits and are available on-call from 8 a.m. to midnight (seven days a week) through a dedicated patient phone line.

A home health aide may be assigned the role of tending to the client's personal hygiene and comfort with personalized, safe care, thereby giving caregivers a respite.





HOME SUPPORT PROGRAM

The home support program is offered on a regular, structured basis by a Nova home health aide specifically assigned to in-home care and trained in this area. A social worker and/or nurse is involved in establishing the work plan of our home health aides.

The support provided by home care aides aims to help patients perform daily activities and give caregivers a respite. The home care aides focus on personal hygiene, physical well-being, mobility assistance, mental stimulation and other home activities. We work to ensure continuity of care for our clients. To this end, we try to make sure that the same home care aide is providing the care week after week.

This service is offered to people with fragile health, living with chronic diseases such as Alzheimer's disease, Multiple Sclerosis, and cancer as well as those who have suffered a stroke.







For the Québec Blue Cross® Home Palliative Care Mentorship Program, the past year was rich in training and discussion

We are proud to report that over 350 participants have benefitted from this training program since 2019. The impact that palliative care has on people who are ill and their families is at the heart of our mission and is a source of motivation.

The program has met with a unanimous response from professionals. Being better equipped allows them to offer adapted care and respond more promptly to situations affecting the patients and their families.

Palliative care is an expertise in itself, and Nova Home Care embraces its role in advancing the field and providing knowledge and tools to nurses across the province.

This past year, most training took place, once again, via videoconference. Our team of trainers were nonetheless very happy to resume in-person training, which everyone has missed over the past two years.

On behalf of Nova Home Care, the nurses who received the training and, most importantly, the people in palliative and end-of-life care in Quebec along with their families, we thank Québec Blue Cross® for financially supporting this program since 2019.



OUR KEY COMMUNITY PARTNERS

NOVA HOME CARE AT THE HEART OF THE COMMUNITY

Nova Home Care has once again set itself the goal of being active in the community by forging close ties with community organizations offering complementary services in our service area. Our main objective is to offer our clients a variety of services to help them navigate the difficulties of illness as smoothly as possibly.

Nova has also offered several conferences and workshops with the principal aim of democratizing home care in Quebec.

Groupe des proches aidants du Sud-Ouest (GASO)

In 2023, Nova Home Care and GASO established a partnership to unite their forces, join their missions and enhance their positive impact in the community. This partnership aims to encourage mutual referrals in order to reach more people who could benefit from the services of either organization. We also aim to facilitate the exchange of information and best practices related to fundraising and ties with the beneficiaries, in addition to working in a complementary fashion to avoid duplication of services.

Jeanne Mance Foundation

The Jeanne Mance Foundation has been a partner of Nova Home Care since 2021. The Jeanne Mance Foundation offers professional home support services to people at the end of their lives and their loved ones, with an emphasis on spiritual needs. The aim of this partnership is to optimize the services offered to people at the end of life. Specifically, Nova Home Care offers its palliative care patients the spiritual care provided by the Jeanne Mance Foundation, while the Jeanne Mance Foundation refers patients in their charge to our palliative care program, when the individuals are in our service area. In addition, a spiritual companion from the Jeanne Mance Foundation organizes discussion groups with the Nova clinical team to prevent compassion fatigue and educate nurses on the basics of spiritual care.

Ouebec Cancer Foundation

The Quebec Cancer Foundation has been a partner of Nova Home Care since March 2021. This partnership aims to optimize the support we provide to people affected by cancer. In the past year, Nova offered two free webinars intended primarily for caregivers in order to demystify palliative care for oncology clientele.

Examples of palliative care myths:

- Palliative care is for people dying of cancer.
- Morphine is given to hasten death.

Our organizations hope to help deconstruct taboos and promote the right to palliative care.

In September 2022, Nova Home Care also participated in the *La marche du Grand défoulement*, a charity walk organized by the Quebec Cancer Foundation. This annual peer-to-peer fundraising effort aims to raise funds to support people living with cancer. Fifteen people from Nova Home Care—employees, directors and family members—formed a team to collect donations for our clients with cancer. This philanthropic activity allowed us to raise a few thousand dollars.



McGill's Council on Palliative Care

In April 2022, Dominique Gohier, Clinical Director at Nova Home Care, participated in the workshop Palliative Care at Home: Access and Services in Montreal, organized by McGill's Council on Palliative Care.

This workshop, offered to the general public, addressed the issue of access to home palliative care and discussed the services currently offered on the Island of Montreal as well as the work being done with other partners in the community. Many ill individuals who are seeking home care have found it difficult to find information on how to access palliative care; the purpose of this workshop was to remedy this problem.

Association québécoise des soins palliatifs

Dominique Gohier, Clinical Director at Nova Home Care, also participated, last May, in the roundtable discussion Remaining at Home: Option or Illusion at the annual conference of Association québécoise des soins palliatifs. This was an opportunity for her to speak about the lived experiences of Nova Home Care clients who choose to remain at home and to share some key factors to ensuring that home care is successful.

LÉO Collectif

Nova Home Care's home health aides participated in a series of workshops offered by LÉO collectif. LÉO collectif provides psychological support to small groups of Quebec employees cooperatives and NPOs to allow for discussion on subjects that are of concern to them. This helps give our home health aides the tools to feel more comfortable at work. Each workshop cycle includes three two-hours sessions with two psychotherapists. The participants are given a lot of room to speak and express themselves. They are also provided with tools to help them overcome daily difficulties and disruptions. Thank you to Léo Collectif for this service that has made a big difference for our team of home health aides!

Table de concertation régionale des personnes proches aidantes de Montréal (TCRPAM)

In March 2023, Nova Home Care participated in the Table de concertation régionale des personnes proches aidantes de Montréal (TCRPAM). The objective was to discuss the future of caregivers in Quebec and the best ways to support them.

Jacques-Bouchard Foundation

In 2019, Nova Home Care was fortunate to receive a donation from the Jacques-Bouchard Foundation, whose mission is to promote and support access to home palliative care for adults and children who want this option and whose condition allows for it.

The Nova Home Health Care team was very sad to learn of the passing of Caroline Bouchard in October 2021. Just before the first anniversary of her passing, we were surprised to find out that she had left \$200,000 to Nova. This gesture shows that palliative care is a cause she cared about deeply. We are grateful to her for this generous donation, which will allow us to pursue our mission of providing high-quality, personalized and compassionate home care to people who are ill and at the end of their lives as well as to their loved ones.

Nova Home Care also offers various complementary services to our patients, including wellness services such as massage therapy and psychosocial support. The generosity of the Jacques-Bouchard Foundation also allows us to provide respite for caregivers and financial support for home support equipment rental.

Grace Dart Foundation

The Grace Dart Foundation has provided financial support to Nova Home Care since 2019. This meaningful partnership allows Nova to reach more isolated seniors and provide them with health care and support in their homes. These clients have substantial needs. More than ever, we are seeing that many seniors want to remain in the comfort of their own homes and receive compassionate, high-quality care.

This past year, Nova Home Care continued to address isolation among seniors by cultivating strong ties with an array of community organizations in its service area. This partnership also allows our organization to refine its communication tools and develop new avenues for funding.

As a non-profit organization whose mission depends primarily on donations, we are appreciative of this extraordinary partnership that allows us to achieve our mission while strengthening our financial sustainability.

Louise and Alan Edwards Foundation

We would like to extend a special thanks to the Louise and Alan Edwards Foundation for being an invaluable partner over the past years. The Foundation was created in 2000 by Alan Edwards, a visionary and admired philanthropist, and its impact in our community has only grown since then. Today, his children Jane and Eric continue the family legacy. With their financial support, our organization can continue to provide dignified, high-quality home care that allows patients to avoid multiple trips to the hospital. Your generosity gives us wings year after year.



L'APPUI POUR LES PROCHES AIDANTS

L'Appui has provided financial support to Nova Home Care since 2013, to the great benefit of the families receiving care from our organization. Thanks to the support of L'Appui, the caregivers for patients in our two programs (home palliative care and home support) can benefit from free respite services (day, evening and night) offered by home health aides who have been trained to meet the specific needs of our clients. Palliative care caregivers receive 12 hours of free respite services, while home support caregivers receive six (a new offering this year thanks to the generosity and openness of L'Appui).

The importance of helping caregivers is based on prevention, since devotion to a loved one can lead caregivers to neglect themselves. Over time, the lack of balance caused by providing care and sacrificing one's needs can lead to compassion fatigue and exhaustion.

Between April 2022 and March 2023, a total of 9,874 hours of respite services were offered to palliative care and home support caregivers.

SOCIAL WORKER TO SUPPORT CAREGIVERS

Psychological support for families has always been an essential component of Nova's service offering. Support for caregivers is provided through our palliative care and home support programs.

After a year in which we had to cut back our psychological support services due to the departure of a full-time social worker, we are very glad to have welcomed on board a new team member at the beginning of 2023. Over the past year, close to 718 hours of psychological support were offered to patients and caregivers.


In December 2022, our social worker organized an activity for families of patients who had recently passed away. A total of 5 people participated in this activity, which was also open to the caregivers for patients who had died in the last 12 months. This event gave rise to meaningful discussions and outpourings of support between attendees. Hugs were shared, phone numbers were exchanged and tears were shed. Most importantly, there was plenty of laughter, which was beautiful and meaningful to everyone.
